THE HISTORY OF BLACK HISTORY MONTH

Black History was originally recognized as "Negro History Week" in 1926. Carter G. Woodson is largely credited with the promotion of the recognition of Black History Month. Woodson was born to former slaves, worked in the Kentucky coal mines as a child, he completed high school and went on to earn a Ph.D. from Harvard. Throughout his studies he was disturbed by the absence of information pertaining to the contributions of Black Americans to our history and took on the challenge of writing about the many admirable contributions made by African Americans.

Woodson chose the second week of February to celebrate Black History because of the fact that the birthdays of Fredrick Douglas and Abraham Lincoln occurred during this week and the contributions of these two people that had a great impact on the Black American population. Over the years Negro History Week evolved into the Black History Month that we celebrate today.

As we prepare to recognize Black History Month, it is important that we take this opportunity to promote an appreciation for the many heroic sacrifices made by many brave souls under extremely dangerous circumstances.

HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL DAY

January 27th has been designated as Holocaust Memorial Day. This web site has a wealth of information on this topic and may be helpful in planning related activities. The following excerpt is from the above mentioned web site:

Between 1933 and 1945, over six million men, women, and children were systematically murdered by the German Nazi party because they were identified as being Jewish. Not only German Jews, but those in surrounding countries- Poland, Holland, France, Greece and many others- were deliberately sought out to be annihilated. The society where this took place considered itself to be 'civilized'. It had, as its tradition and heritage, the Christian religion, together with a wealth of poets, philosophers, scientists and musicians.

A British soldier, inaptly named John Coward, was captured by the Germans. He soon realized that the POW camp adjoined a Jewish section where conditions were indescribably worse. He hit upon an idea to save lives. When a prisoner on his side of the camp died, he would drag the body to the wire and exchange the dead man for one of the Jewish inmates.




